# Dance on a Theme Of San Francisco

In his "United States" dances, David Gordon has come up with a marketing director's dream, a series of dance pieces celebrating the particular qualities of people and place in specific geographical areas. "United States," which is to be a full-evening sum of its parts, will be presented in its entirety at the Brooklyn Academy of Music in December.

Meantime, Gordon already has the flags flying over two sections of the country, both favorite stopping places of his high-spirited Pick Up Company.

First came "Minnesota" last year, and now it's San Francisco's turn with Gordon's witty and impish "Sang and Sang," premiered Wednesday on the opening night of the 10-day run of the Pick Up Company at Theatre Artaud. "Minnesota" is also on the program, along with "The Seasons," the latter having had major surgery since the Pick Up Company last presented it

Gordon has brought along a strong company of nine dancers counting himself, although he appears in only one dance, "The Seasons," in which he performs in the fashion of Ashton's "Les Patineurs" a remarkable wintry skating duet with his wife, the notable dancer Valda Setterfield.

Setterfield, a dancer with the Merce Cunningham Company for many years, is the central visual focus for Gordon's dances. Her lithe presence radiates the puckishly amusing lyricism ingrained in Gordon's dances. Setterfield's voice, so British and perfectly compact, is the one we hear in one talking dance, the same voice that speaks

the prelude in "Murder," constructed for Mikhail Baryshnikov.

"Sang and Sang" takes its title from the miming the dancers must do when directly facing the audione San Francisco ballad after another, from Carmen McRae's "I'm Always Drunk in San Francisco." to Jeanette MacDonald's plea of "San Francisco, Open Your Golden Gate," to Judy Garland, assorted

others, and ending with Tony Bennett's "I Left My Heart in San Francisco" as Dean Moss does a few solitary turns around the stage.

It's hard to imagine that Mac-Donald could have enjoyed such imence as the sound track spews out mense popularity possessing such a dreadfully thin voice, and Setterfield, dressed in bright pink organdy flowers and ruffles, makes the parody devastating. Every time Chuck Hammer's sound score points in the direction of MacDonald's voice, Setterfield does wonderfully silly things with her body, supported in outlandish and melodramatic poses by the faithful Heidi

Within the San Francisco song quotes comes the third movement of Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 17, transcribed for synthesizer and performed by Norman Landsberg. This is Gordon's purported connecting link with "Minnesota," which uses the first two movements. Outlandish as it seems in principle, the use of Mozart works out in practice.

Gordon's appealing dancers make "Sang and Sang" a fetching piece, one that wears its heart on its sleeve. There's a lot of fun in this dance, a lot of affection and joy as

"Minnesota," on the other hand, seems to come from someone's dream, an essence of place remembered. Setterfield's voiceover narration of various texts makes the point that when it comes to art, country and city folks are definitely from different places. This becomes quite moving when,

at the start of the second movement, she talks of being introduced to the "guiltless pleasure of the dance," at the same time the Pick Up dancers move into the lighted space behind a shimmering curtain, as if in a dream.

Setterfield is the one we see at the beginning and the close of "Minnesota," her body echoing the natural rhythm and movement that is so fetching in children. Her childlike artifice frames a dance in which the phrases link together in a chain of comment about the relationships and interaction of various-sized groups. The essential humanity of "Minnesota" is what comes to mind in watching the partnering, lifts and lines where games, sportsmanship, fun, friendship and comradeship are important elements.

For his own reasons, Gordon revised "The Seasons" to accommodate the studio space of Theatre Artaud. It had worked fine as a proscenium stage piece at Zellerbach Playhouse, but its impact is even stronger here. For one thing, there is the introduction of a new duet, a beautiful one, presumably for young lovers in the attention that Chuck Finlon and Karen Graham Quinn gave it at the start of the winter section.

When Gordon and Setterfield, who have been married for more than 30 years and whose relationship has always been important in Gordon's dances, made their entrance to begin their slow rounds about the floor, the effect was stunning. It was as if one were being faced with a metaphor for life.

The Pick Up Company continues nightly through Sunday, and the Wednesday through Sunday schedule continues next week as well.
